

COVID Vaccines/boosters at WRF

- At this point, **we are only offering the Pfizer vaccine**. The CDC has ok'd getting a different booster vaccine type - "mix and match" is ok, and a sufficient antibody response has been shown with any combination. One combination is not better than any other.
 - Once eligible for a booster shot, no matter which vaccine was received originally, people can receive a booster of their choosing: Pfizer, Moderna, or Johnson & Johnson.
 - **Moderna and Pfizer** originally: people in the following groups are eligible to receive a booster shot at least 6 months after completion of their primary series:
 - 65 years and older
 - Age 18+ who:
 - live in long term care setting
 - have underlying medical conditions
 - live or work in high-risk settings
 - **Johnson & Johnson** originally: People 18+ that received J&J COVID-19 vaccine at least 2 months ago can receive a booster shot.
- COVID-19 vaccine can be given at the same time as other vaccines, such as flu, shingles, and pneumonia.
- Individuals self-report that they are eligible to receive a booster shot, no documentation needed.
- People are still considered "fully vaccinated" 2 weeks after completing the initial series.

Scheduling a booster shot at WRF:

- You must bring your vaccination card to your appointment
 - If you have lost your vaccination card:
 - COVID-19 vaccine administered in VT originally – we can look you up and provide with a new card. Please send this to MA prior to booster appt.
 - COVID-19 vaccine administered in NH originally – we cannot look you up. Please go to <https://www.vaccines.nh.gov/vaccination-record-instructions>, contact the location that provided your original vaccination, or call 211. You will need this in order to receive your booster.
